Key Questions

- 1. # guests in last 6 months?
- 2. # returned?
 - Why? Why not?
- 3. What (your opinion, or theirs) were they looking for?
 - Did they find it?
 - How would they evaluate that?
 - What might they find unusual?



What Is It Like to Be a Guest in Your Church?

Think Like a Guest



- Large percentages of North Americans have no religious affiliation or experience
- Most people have never been to an Orthodox Church
- Help people know what to expect and feel welcome




Desired vs. Actual Experiences

Improving First Time Experiences

Desired

- What experiences do you <u>want</u> to convey to first time guests?
 - What do you want them to say/feel afterward?



Actual

- What <u>are</u> the experiences of:
 - A non Orthodox inquirer in our parish?
 - Orthodox, but new to our parish



Read the summary <u>here</u>

Home Grown Mystery Worshipper?

- Pay someone to attend for three weeks!
- Follow up for reactions
- Do they come back w/o \$.



Mystery Worshipper Highlights

(Lowlights)

- "...impossible to determine the exact point at which the service had actually begun..."
- "This is apparently a church that does not expect outsiders ... not worried that strangers will show up and be confused".
- "When I arrived, there were about 10 to15 people... continued to drift in for an additional 30 minutes! Was I at church or the train station?
- "people were standing around talking in (ethnic language). I learned that a smile and "hello" apparently mean "I'm not one of you; ignore me" in _____."
- "I hung around at back looking lost... no one spoke to me. People looked at me & quickly averted their gaze."

- "...like being in the Russian section of heaven"
- "There's a lot of Pantocrator and not too much carpenter. For me, this church brings out Christ's divine nature more strongly than his human nature."
- "...service book and bulletin dwelt on exclusiveness of Orthodox Christianity too much to make other Christians feel comfortable."
- "Being grilled by the priest. I'm happy to be identified as a goat to be kept separated from the sheep, but in guarding the integrity of communion, Father should lighten up."
- "service was hardly visitor friendly. I spent first half flipping around the service book"

Manage Impressions Before Greeters...

Hospitality & Expectations





Tips

- Welcome!
- Aid worship experience
- Watch "tone" & language level
- Consider adapting unfamiliar liturgical terms
 - "Prokeimenon" vs. "Responsorial Psalm".
- Beware...
 - local acronyms & terms
 - Incomplete Info "meeting @ Betty's house; usual time"
- Include:
 - Website, street address, phone #'s
- Track "Real Estate"
 - Non Core Activities
- Tell Stories of New People
- Info for guests
 - Rest rooms etc.
 - When NOT to leave.

Other Pre-Greeting Experiences

- Phone
 - Answer machine up to date?
 - Speak to a live person?
 - Pleasant answer

EQUIPPING AN EFFECTIVE GREETERS MINISTRY

What's Your Idea of Greeting?

This?



Or This?



It often isn't this obvious!

Two Initial Thoughts...

Getting them to your front door is "evangelism."



Greeting starts when they come through the front door.



If you don't have many visitors, it's not the Greeters program that's a failure.

...And One Subsequent One

"Visitor" or "Guest"

Visitor: One who goes to a museum (which implies...)

<u>Guest</u>: Someone you welcome into your own home (which further implies...)

Eight Traits of Greeters

Establishing a Greeters Ministry

- Recruit those w/ gifts of hospitality, evangelism
- Take this ministry seriously! NOT just a fill-in position
- Do NOT assume everyone can do this well



- 1. Engaging smiler!
- 2. Hospitable, warm, friendly
- 3. Diligent, faithful
- 4. Good listener
- 5. Sincere, genuine
- 6. Helpful

Some Tips...

It's more than a handshake!

DO:

- Smile! Look like you like people
- Fresh breath
- Initiate! Make eye contact, shake a hand, welcome
- Offer a bulletin, free literature
- Show them where the restrooms are
- Offer help to light a candle

DON'T:

- Ask "Are you new?"
- Ask "Is this your first time?"
- Ask "Are you Antigreessian?"
- Ask for contact info right away



Some More Tips...

- Arrive on time. Dress Appropriately
- Imagine how the guest is feeling
- Be Prepared look over bulletin, know what special events & services are taking place
- Capture info for follow up (if natural)
- Expect the unexpected (Therapeutic dogs?)
- Don't publicly introduce guests
- Handoffs for follow up → This is important!



Listening is Important!

→ Should be **OBVIOUS** that your visitor isn't happy with his *HIS* church because that's what drove him to visit *YOUR* church!

- He'd like to talk about it, so...
- Concentrate on what he is saying, thinking, and feeling
- Do not give them YOUR advice, YOUR experiences or YOUR thoughts and feelings (it's not about you!)
- Don't drive him away by taking over the conversation and preaching "Orthodoxy"

Likes and Dislikes

LIKED:

- Nothing special during service; treated no differently
- Greeted individually after the service by people
- Information about parish readily available
- Received thank you note from priest/greeter that week
- Coffee Hour!

DISLIKED:

- Priest/layman visited their home that week
- Asked to wear a name tag at the service
- Asked to I.D. themselves, as a guest/visitor, during service
- Small gift brought to home as a thank-you for visiting






The Liturgy After the Liturgy

The "common work of the people", Part 2

- Get them to coffee hour...
 or bookstore... or talking
 with the priest
- Get into a "substantive conversation" – remember why they're there (but don't push!)
- Avoid Orthodox arrogance
- Everybody's job!



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

One by One

ELIMINATING SEEKER INSENSITIVE BEHAVIORS

Seeker Insensitive Behaviors

- "Are you Antigreessian?"
- "You're in MY seat!" (harumph, sputter)
- "Why are you here?" (vs. "how?")
- "I don't know, ask Father"
- "Would you like to buy..."
- Correcting ... "don't do that"
- Ethnic food emphasis
- Introducing guests/ ask to raise hands
- Glaring at children




Taming Difficult Behaviors

Insensitive Behavior	Unfortunate Implication	A better approach?
"Are you Antigreessian?" (or insert favorite ethnic offender)	This place is closed to you	"We're a multi-ethnic parish"
"You're in MY seat!"	We have rules here & we don't share them!	There is no better approach; don't say this
"Why are you here?"	"You don't look 'right'"; "We've actually never had a visitor."	"Did you find us through our website?"
"I don't know, ask Father" (in response to any serious question)	"We're not serious about our faith we're just here for the coffee"	"That's a very good question. We teach(or) My understanding is"
"Would you like to buy" Fund raising appeals	"we expect others to pay for our church budget" or "Things are desperate here."	There is no better approach; don't say this
"Our people"	" are not YOU"	"You'd love it here, it's easy to get to know everyone!"
Correcting "don't do that"		There is no better approach; don't do this
Introducing guests/ask to raise hands	"We're a well oiled recruiting machine"	"We'd like to extend a warm welcome to all our guests today"
Orthodox arrogance	"I'm Orthodox and you're wrong"	There is no better approach; don't say this
Ethnic food emphasis	"We'll keep reminding you that you're —well - different"	"Please try some of this, it's my grandmother's recipe"
Glaring at children	"Its only the beginning wait 'til you get to know us!"	There is no better approach; don't do this

The Pew Blocker

Do you have these types in your parish?

- Body language conveys a clear message: Do not enter. Do not sit near me. I've found my seat and I'm keeping it.
- "Even in movie theaters with complete strangers, ushers ask people to move to the center so others can find seats easily
- "clergy and greeters... encourage others to slide away from the aisle so that others could sit next to them?
- Reserve a pew at the back
- Or better yet invite visitors and strangers to sit near you.


A Parish Inviting Effort

Increasing the Likelihood of Return

FOLLOWING UP

Visitor Follow-up: A Clear Next Step

- Post-liturgy greeter: the "Up-fronters"
- Follow-up contact within 2-3 days
- Invite them to join existing ministry groups
- Feedback: Ask newcomers what they found
 - helpful
 - Off-putting
- Ask those that did not return their reactions
- Don't overly "processify" this. Natural.

Now that we've established an atmosphere of hospitality... getting started with...

A PARISH WIDE INVITING **EFFORT**

Parish Wide Inviting Effort

Goal

- Everybody invite someone in next six months
- Create environment where inviting becomes natural –part of what parishioners do, so...
- Provide some training (see Session 2 materials)

Don't

- Focus only on *lapsed* parishioners
 - Some may honestly take a second look but they do bring baggage
 - They left/stopped for a reason unless you can convincingly demonstrate a change, don't bother
- Concentrate on <u>one</u> Sunday

Celebrate

— Who invited the most? Thank you!

When inviting becomes a part of parish life it becomes easier to invite – infectious

APPENDIX

Bulletin – Welcome Text

 Various Versions of Welcome Text for Use in Parish Bulletins to convey that communion is restricted to prepared Orthodox Christians

We welcome all visitors to our Divine Liturgy. While Holy Communion may only be received by prepared Orthodox Christians, our non-Orthodox guests are welcome to join us in venerating the Cross and receiving blessed bread at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy.

Thank you for choosing to worship with us. We're grateful for your prayers and participation.

Then text similar to one the others... then...

Join us for coffee and continued fellowship!

If this is your first visit to our parish, we welcome you and invite you to return as often as you are able. For those interested in learning more about Orthodoxy, please contact Fr. _____ about our Entrants Group. Greeters will answer immediate questions you might have.

We are delighted to have visitors worship with us, and we pray that you will be blessed through your participation in our services.

In the Orthodox Church, the reception of Holy Communion is a mark of membership in the Church. Only those who have been united to the Orthodox Church through Baptism or Chrismation, and have prepared themselves through regular Confession, prayer and fasting are permitted to partake of Holy Communion. We encourage visitors to participate in our prayers and hymns and partake of the blessed bread at the veneration of the cross. Literature about the Orthodox faith and this parish can be found in the vestibule. Feel free to ask questions before or after the services. Please sign our guest book and join us for refreshments and fellowship in the Parish Center after Liturgy.

Scriptural References

Reflecting on the following passages will assist you in discovering more fully the attitudes and principles of hospitality for which we will be held accountable.

Gospels:

- Matt. 8: 5-13: Jesus is gracious to the centurion.
- Mt. 10:40: "Whoever receives you receives me, and whoever receives me receives the one who sent me."
- Mt. 18:20: "Where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in your midst."
- Mt. 25:35: "When I was a stranger you welcomed me."
- Mark 14:3-9: Jesus is anointed at the home of Simon the leper.
- Luke 10:25-37: Jesus gives a lesson on hospitality the Good Samaritan.
- Luke 10:38-42: Jesus is welcomed in Bethany.
- Luke 19:1-10: Zaccheus experiences Jesus' hospitality.
- Luke 24:13-35: In the Emmaus story, two travelers receive the unexpected blessings of the Lord himself.
- John 4:28-29: The Samaritan woman at the well experiences the hospitality of Jesus.

Epistles:

- Acts: 9:43-10:48 Luke weaves together three stories of hospitality that become a turning point for spreading the Gospel by welcoming Gentiles into the Church.
- Romans 12: 9-17: St. Paul speaks of hospitality in the context of mutual love.
- Romans 15:7: "It can only be to the glory of God, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you."
- I Cor. 12: 18-22: There are many different members in the one body; each is important and indeed, indispensible.
- Hebrews 13:1-2: "Love your fellow Christians always. Do not neglect hospitality, for by that means some have entertained angels without knowing it."
- 1 Peter 4:8-9: "Above all, let your love for one another be constant, for love covers a multitude of sins. Be mutually hospitable without complaining. Put yourself at the service of others."

Old Testament

- Genesis 18: 1-5: Abraham and Sarah's care and concern for three strangers brings an unexpected reward.
- Judges 19:20: "You are welcome, but let me provide for all your needs, and do not spend the night in the public square.' So he led them to his house and provided fodder for the asses. Then he washed their feet, and ate and drank."
- 1 Kings 17:9-24: The widow of Zarephath offers shelter and the last of her food to Elijah and is rewarded by the raising of her son from the dead.
